One day from URC daily devotions

St Luke 6: 27 - 36

'But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you.

'If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.'

Reflection

Oh dear! When I read this teaching of Jesus I so relate to what the Apostle Paul wrote, "I do not understand my own actions.... For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do." (Romans 7. 15a & 19) – how about you?

The teaching of Jesus is challenging, setting a very high standard for his followers, a standard that too many of us fail to reach. Yes, there are those who do set an example in the way they live which attracts others to Jesus, but are you among them? I know that I can make no such claim.

Two quotations from Mahatma Gandhi also come to mind, "If I had to face only the Sermon on the Mount and my own interpretation of it, I should not hesitate to say, 'O yes, I am a Christian.'" (quoted by Homer A Jack) and, "I like your Christ. I do not like your Christians. Your Christians are so unlike your Christ." (quoted by William Rees-Mogg). Our passage today is about "love" and it is helpful to remember that "the Greek language has three words for love, which enable us to distinguish Christian love (agapé) from passionate love (eros) and warm affection (philia). Jesus did not tell his disciples to fall in love with their enemies or to feel for them as they felt for their families and friends." (G B Caird, Commentary on Luke). Christian love is a positive concern for the true welfare of others, "We love because (God) first loved us." (1 John 4. 19) Even as we are honest about our failure to be the people we should be, we must still remember that God loves us and that our sins are forgiven as we

forgive those who sin against us.

Prayer

Gracious God: you know us as we truly are, and still love us! Help us, we pray, to be honest with you and with ourselves so that we may be released from past failures and enabled to be more and more the people you want us to be; in our Saviour's name and power - Amen.

Bible Reading - Luke 4:14-21

Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone. When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind,

to let the oppressed go free,

to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour."

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

Reflection

As I mentioned at the start of the service the majority of my time is spent ministering at St Barnabas and St Marys Church but there is also another side to my role. I am also in the middle of a large research project with children, based in one of our local primary schools. My research explores how children make meaning in their lives, particularly through exploring stories. As part of this I spend a lot of time reading and thinking about the question of meaning. What makes life meaningful to us? Is a meaningful life important? What difference does it make in life to know who you are and why you are here?

Interestingly a whole raft of psychological research tells us that having a sense of meaning in our lives is one of the biggest indicators of good mental health. A lack of meaning in life has been linked to a whole range of challenges both mental and physical. Seeing our lives as purposeful and meaningful seems to buffer us against many of the challenges life inevitably throws up. It makes us more resilient and stronger in who we are. And the good news is that those who have a religious faith seem to have a head start on this and generally have a greater sense of their life as meaningful and purposeful. It was fascinating, then, to read this passage of one of Jesus' experiences early on in his ministry. Right out of the gate we see that Jesus' understanding of his life is full of meaning and purpose. He knows that he has been called, he knows that God's spirit us upon him and he knows what the job at hand is, to 'bring good news to the poor, recovery of sight to the blind, and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour'.

Of course, prior to this reading that we have had the stories of Jesus' baptism and then his forty days in the wilderness. Both stories strike me as times when Jesus was deliberately clarifying the meaning and purpose of his life. He goes out into the wilderness to reflect on what is coming for him and he is challenged there, challenged to take an easier path, to evade the difficulties that are coming and take an easier path. Being clear on his purpose Jesus is able to overcome these temptations and to emerge, back in his hometown of Nazareth, with a clear understanding of his purpose and what he is here to do.

I don't think it is possible to underestimate how important this time was for Jesus at the start of his ministry, and we see him continually going back out for mini wilderness moments throughout the gospel stories. Jesus is often described as going off to quiet places to pray. Perhaps in these times he was renewing his sense of purpose as he faced the challenges around him.

It strikes me that sometimes we need to do just that same, as individuals and as a community. That there are times when we need to take time to connect with God, to connect with our sense of meaning and purpose. And that this is so vital for us to be able to move forward with the confidence that Jesus shows.

But of course, we are also lucky to have somewhat of a head start. Jesus' mission is also our mission. His identity is also our own. Through him we know that God calls us too, to 'proclaim the year of the Lord's favour' and to continue the mission that Jesus started. We also know through Jesus that our identity, purpose and sense of meaning is rooted firmly in God's love for us. In the light of that love the whole world looks different and our lives truly can be filled with meaning and purpose. So perhaps this week you might find some time to reflect on what matters most to you? To consider what makes your life purposeful and meaningful? Through taking this time our with God we can only strengthen ourselves as we go forwards.
