One day from URC daily devotions

St Luke 4: 42 - 44

At daybreak he departed and went into a deserted place. And the crowds were looking for him; and when they reached him, they wanted to prevent him from leaving them. But he said to them, 'I must proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God to the other cities also; for I was sent for this purpose.' So he continued proclaiming the message in the synagogues of Judea.

Reflection

There are many demands on our time. Demands from family, from friends, from neighbours, from bosses and from colleagues. It's just the way life is. There are even demands from church. Most of these demands are reasonable and perhaps even do-able. We could easily fit them if we tried, couldn't we?

But are these demands actually for us? And are they what God is calling us to do, right here and right now? Could it even be that it would be better for us to pass by on the request and to empower someone else to do it?

In this passage, Jesus is facing lots of demands on his time. He'd tried to escape and get away for some alone time, but the crowds kept following him and presenting their demands to him. All their requests were reasonable. He could easily have stayed to help them and continue the good work He'd started in their area. It would have been the obvious thing to do.

But the plans of Jesus were different to the plans of the crowd. He knew what His purpose under God was and He stuck to it. May God be praised for that.

Prayer

Dear God, thank You that You have a purpose for each one of us right here and right now. You even have a purpose for us in the day ahead. Give us grace to see what You are graciously calling us to do and to respond with joy to Your call.

Amen.

A Simple Reflective Service for Sunday 16th January 2022 at 10am - Second Sunday after Epiphany

Welcome and Introduction - David

Good morning. I welcome you to our Sunday morning Reflective Service, watching online, reading at home or here in Church. It is good to be together again, especially in our Church.

Today's service is entitled "All in God's Time". In John's Gospel he refers to the fact that immediately after calling the disciples, we witness Jesus's first miracle while he and his mother Mary are attending a wedding celebration and the wine runs out. Jesus is encouraged by Mary to help the situation and instructs the servants to fill six jugs with water. Much to everybody's astonishment, as the liquid is poured out of the jugs what comes out is the finest wine, and his new disciples believe in him. So this week we celebrate God transforming the ordinary for us.

Call to Worship

Loving Lord, it's time to celebrate your love or us. Come, see Jesus, the one who delights us, the one who delights in us, the one whose miraculous grace can change us into something beautiful – Amen

Prayer of Praise and Thanksgiving, Gathering Prayer and the Lord's Prayer

Bible Reading: John Chapter 2 – verses 1 – 11 – Jesus Changes Water into Wine

On the third day a wedding took place at Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine was gone, Jesus' mother said to him, "They have no more wine." "Woman,[a] why do you involve me?" Jesus replied. "My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Nearby stood six stone water jars, the kind used by the Jews for ceremonial washing, each holding from twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water"; so they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Now draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet."

They did so, and the master of the banquet tasted the water that had been turned into wine. He did not realise where it had come from, though the servants who had drawn the water knew. Then he called the bridegroom aside and said, "Everyone brings out the choice wine first and then the cheaper wine after the guests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now." What Jesus did here in Cana of Galilee was the first of the signs through which he revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him. - THANKS BE TO GOD FOR HIS WORD

Reflection - All in God's Time

This week's passage prompts questions about transformation, both in our own lives and our communities. Where do we see God doing extraordinary things in our everyday ordinary lives? Where are the everyday miracles and how is God transforming us into something beautiful?

Some people would read a well-known miracle story such as this with great suspicion and would perhaps say that it was nothing but a very good conjuring trick. Or we might think that people 'back then' were just more credulous than us. These thoughts do not do justice to the miracle of the water changed into wine so consider, for example, the first person whose job it was to taste the wine. He is not a fool and after tasting the wine would probably have thought that the quality was perfect and the host is being very generous by serving such a good wine so late in the celebrations instead of serving the poor wine when everybody was drunk.

People are inclined to forget what Mary's role was in the story. Would the miracle have taken place if it were not for her telling Jesus that the wine had run out. Sometimes Mary is overlooked, but her quiet presence is important in making sure this first miracle took place. She saw a problem and identified a solution by speaking words that were very effective. The wedding in Cana is a celebration, a party, that Jesus and his mother were invited to attend. Jesus turned a regular wedding celebration into something extraordinary.

Some years ago when I was a Governor at the Francis Baily School I was talking to a group of seven year olds about Jesus and having mentioned the miracle of changing water into wine, asked them what they would have done in this situation. One little girl stood up and with hands on hips proclaimed that she would have sacked the person responsible for not ordering enough wine in the first place. Don't you just love them at this age.

All in God's time!' I am sure you have heard the phrase – or something like it. But it's not always that easy, is it? We don't want to wait for things, we want them now – that is the culture, the twenty-first century society that we live in. We want things to change now. Whether it is a family member we want to be healed, a house move to go through smoothly, or the perfect job – we want it now.

Last year, when we were in the middle of lockdowns and restrictions, all of that stopped for a while. We could no longer just get in the car and drive to see family and friends whenever we wanted. We could not go on holiday at the drop of a hat. Celebrations – weddings, special birthdays, all sorts of things – couldn't take place or if they did, only in a very limited way. Of course, some of it was very hard: funerals with just a handful of family present; many of those shielding had little or no human contact for months. Yet, despite the undeniable difficulties and challenges, and without wanting in any way to play down the harmful effects of the lockdown, the part of it that was pressing pause on the 'now culture' was certainly not all negative.

We had to find other ways to celebrate. Some of us mastered the technology and shared birthdays via computer and phone screens. For many, going outside became much more important – we celebrated the sunrises and sunsets, starlit skies, waves crashing on a beach, a walk in the park, the first snowdrop or daffodil blooming. Whatever it was for each of us, little things became important and we celebrated them. We had to look for the extraordinary in the ordinary, and appreciate the smaller things in life, or things that we never noticed before in all our rushing around.

The power of the miracle lies not in how it was brought about, but in what it shows us about Jesus as God's Son. In the middle of an ordinary event, a wedding, God reveals his unprecedented hospitality. God upends the expectations. In the ordinary run of things, the best wine is served first; in God's reality, our expectations are turned upside down. The miracle happens on 'the third day'. It is a foreshadowing of God's definitive work of love: the resurrection of Jesus on the third day after his crucifixion. In John's Gospel, miracles always proclaim God's love for us in the middle of our ordinary lives. Amen

Second hymn - R&S No 594 - Peace, Perfect Peace

Edward Henry Bickersteth, son of Edward Bickersteth, Sr. was born in Islington in Jan. 1825, and educated at Trinity College, Cambridge. On taking Holy Orders in 1848, he became curate of Banningham, Norfolk, and then of Christ Church, Tunbridge Wells. His preferment to the Rectory of Hinton-Martell, in 1852, was followed by that of the Vicarage of Christ Church, Hampstead, 1855. In 1885 he became Dean of Gloucester, and the same year Bishop of Exeter. This hymn was written by Bishop Edward while he was spending his summer holiday in Harrogate in the year 1875. The words and music for this version were written by Kevin Mayhew.
