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Dear Friends,

Following on from the Repair Shop last month, another story of restoration by a **craftsman**.

There is a Japanese historical tale that speaks of a tea master named Yusai Hosokawa. When he was about to prepare tea for the warlord Hideyoshi, the warlord's young servant dropped an invaluable piece of tea ware, one of the warlords favourites, breaking it into five separate pieces. Hideyoshi raised his hand to punish the young servant, but Yusai Hosokawa intervened, succeeded in gaining mercy for the young servant. Yusai Hosokawa's actions basically atoned for the young servant and took responsibility, saying, "I will be the one to be blamed for his mistake". The young servant was spared.

Yusai Hosokawa, the tea-master, then arranged for the five pieces of pottery to be reconnected using a Japanese lacquer technique with gold gilding and presented it to the warlord. The warlord was very moved by the beauty of the restored tea ware pottery, and the story spread far and wide and became renowned. This act of compassion which added gold into the filled cracks, became the basis of Kintsugi, which created a work of beauty through brokenness, and something more valuable than the original.

Kintsugi: Kin stands for gold and Tsugi means to reconnect or repair. A Kintsugi master mends the broken pottery with Japanese lacquer and then mixes or covers that with gold. Kintsugi does not just fix or repair a broken vessel; rather, the technique makes the broken pottery a new creation and more beautiful than

the original. The Kintsugi master will take the broken work and create **a restored piece** that makes the broken part even more visually sophisticated.

No two works, restored with such mastery, will look the same or have been broken in the same way. There are passages in the Bible which parallel this restoration. Kintsugi is described as a cultural parable. There are shades of biblical redemption here, of a vessel being made into a new creation. The Christian gospel, or good news, begins with the awareness of our brokenness. Christ came not to just fix us, not just to restore us, but also to make us a new creation. The example of Kintsugi captures, and enlarges, this promise.

And as the first fruits of this new creation, did not the resurrected Lord Jesus Christ still bear the **wounds** of his crucifixion in his hands and side, when he was **broken** and then **restored for us**. He showed them to Thomas and the other disciples (see John 20:24-29). Through these wounds of Christ, a new world is born for us; that is, the way to God has been opened and the promise of eternal life has been given. Kintsugi is **a paradox** of destruction and new creation, like the crucifixion and resurrection is for us.

By the grace of God, our cracks and brokenness can **feel like gold** because the repair and restoration has brought about a strength as well as beauty. God loves us with our **faults** and **brokenness**, and loves us so much that he **values the restoration** he makes so much, as if they were as gold. Kintsugi treats the breakage and repair as part of the

object's history. It makes a feature of them. It has had a **life**. Christ does this for us and makes use of what we have experienced to be a blessing to others.

I like the word **Master**. It indicates the one who has the very best expertise, and also the one who has the authority to restore. Our **Lord and Master** Jesus Christ is the ultimate 'Kintsugi Master'. 'If anyone is in Christ, that person is a new creation'.

27 March



Every Day with Jesus aims to bring the Bible to life, and helps to transform our lives and relationships as we encounter God within his Word. The theme of the January

February edition was God's Word, God's Will and God's Work, which is very relevant in our challenging times. The theme of the March/April edition is Glory to Glory and takes us through the repentance and discipline of Lent to the joy and reconciliation with God which the Resurrection brings at Easter.

Maybe it will introduce you to previously unknown or daunting books of the Bible. When we engaged with sections of Psalm 119 we found these significant words:

'Open my eyes that I may see wonderful things in your law' (Psalm 119:18) and its commentary:


'Scripture is always so much more than words on a page. Like the various access points to Narnia created by C. S. Lewis, these words themselves can open our eyes to an entirely fresh understanding of ourselves and how we are to live within the material world. It demands courage and faithfulness, yet that measure of faith will grow ... '

Each time we read Scripture we encounter the living Word, Jesus himself. We know that the Scriptures are foundational to the life of discipleship, but sometimes we need a little nudge to remind or motivate us. Having the little book by your bedside, in your handbag, or setting a reminder on your phone will help to make this a regular daily pattern.

Of course EDWJ is not the only daily Bible reading plan, and some of you have told me about the notes that you follow – thank you. There will be more about other plans in a future edition of the Newsletter. Now let's keep the conversations going: tell each other what you have been reading in EDWJ, learning and putting into action; mostly we read and pray on our own, but sometimes we could read and pray with a friend; listen out for links in the readings and reflections in Sunday services.

Do let me know what you have thought of the Jan/Feb edition of Every Day with Jesus. I am sure there will be much in the March/April edition to enable us to grow in spiritual development and seriously consider how our lives reflect the faith we practise (aims stated in the introduction to the book!)

Lets look forward to more cafe services that we can all take part in as we gradually return to some normalisation. We also look forward to more band members being able to join in as covid restrictions are relaxed.





What the papers say...

Nurse demoted for wearing a christian cross

A Roman Catholic nurse, who was harassed by NHS bosses for wearing a small crucifix, has won her discrimination case against a south London hospital trust. Operating theatre nurse Mary Onuoha, 61, was suspended in November 2018 after she rejected a series of attempts to stop her wearing the item.

Senior staff at Croydon University Hospital in south London had claimed it violated the Trust's dress code and posed an "infection risk".

Employment judge Daniel Dyal upheld Onuoha's claim of constructive and unfair dismissal. In his judgment he wrote that the Trust had created a "hostile and threatening environment" that Onuoha found "humiliating" and had been "offensive and intimidating" when the experienced nurse had complained.

The tribunal heard that she had worn the crucifix without incident for more than 14 years before first being asked to remove it in 2014.

Judge Dyal ruled that the Trust's dress code had been applied "in an arbitrary way". He said there was "no cogent explanation" as to why religious attire such as hijabs and turbans were permitted but not "a fine necklace with a small pendant". The judge added: "There has been no evidence, for instance, that these items carry a lower infection risk than a necklace" and noted that, except in the case of the long-serving nurse, "the wearing of non-compliant jewellery was very widely tolerated".

Onuoha was supported by Christian Concern, Wimpole St, London. Its CEO Andrea Williams welcomed the verdict. "It was astonishing that an experienced nurse, during a pandemic, was forced to choose between her faith and the profession she loves".

A spokesman for Croydon Health Services NHS Trust said: "We would like to apologize to Mrs Onuoha". The Trust added: "It is important that NHS staff feel able to express their beliefs, and that our policies are applied in a consistent, compassionate and inclusive way".

Protect the most vulnerable on our highways

From the Highway Code – a new rule has recently been introduced

January 2022

New Rule: at a junction you should give way to pedestrians crossing or waiting to cross a road into which or from which you are turning.

Reminder: drivers and riders MUST give way to pedestrians on a zebra crossing and to pedestrians and cyclists on a parallel crossing. Pedestrians have priority when on a zebra crossing, on a parallel crossing or at light-controlled crossings when they have a green signal.

You should give way to pedestrians waiting to cross a zebra crossing and to pedestrians and cyclists waiting to cross a parallel crossing.

Horse riders should also give way to pedestrians on a zebra crossing, and to pedestrians and cyclists on a parallel crossing. Cyclists should give way to pedestrians on shared use cycle tracks and to horse riders on bridleways.

Only pedestrians may use the pavement. Pedestrians include wheelchair and mobility scooter users. Pedestrians may use any part of the road and use cycle tracks as well as the pavement, unless there are signs prohibiting pedestrians.

Heat pump bill a third higher than gas boiler

The cost of running a heat pump in an average home will hit more than £1,000 a year for the first time, nearly a third more than a traditional gas boiler. An analysis of Ofgem figures by the Energy and Utilities Alliance, a trade body, has found that when energy bills rise in April, the cost of running a heat pump at the minimum level of efficiency will rise from £919 to £1,251.

This is hundreds of pounds more expensive than a gas boiler, for which prices will climb from £584 to £984.

Teachers urged to drop gender honorifics

One teacher who attended the session and asked to remain anonymous said: "It was propaganda for trans activists".

Lumley: stop jumping on mental illness bandwagon

Mental health issues are being "over¬played", because some people who claim to suffer from it are just feeling sad, Dame Joanna Lumley has said.

The actress and campaigner, who supports mental health charities, has claimed many people jump on the "mental illness bandwagon".

Dame Joanna added that there was a difference between being "sad" and being mentally ill, and suggested some people needed to "get a grip".

She said: "This is a horrible thing to say but I think the mental health thing is being overplayed at the moment because anybody who is even remotely sad says they have got mental problems. [Being sad] is what is called being human. When someone dies and you grieve, that's human. That's what being a human is. You're not mentally ill. I think it also is awful [for] people who really are mentally ill or are prop-erly clinically depressed, for everybody to say they've got to have some sort of treatment. Everyone's claiming the mental illness bandwagon and I think that's wrong".

In an interview with Isabel Oake¬shott, a GB News presenter, she added that the British "stiff upper lip and not blubbing" was "much derided".

The star became a dame in the New Year for services to entertainment and charitable causes and has backed men¬tal health charities as part of her remit. She has also talked of her own strug¬gles in her 20s as a single mother raising her

son, Jamie, that led her to walk out on work commitments and revealed she had a breakdown because she feared rifles were being aimed at her in the Garrick theatre in London's West End.

As every parent knows, there is no career ladder I can climb, no scoop I can land, no TV appearance I can make and no radio show I can present that will beat being a mum.



And certainly, don't let work stand in the way. They won't thank you for it.


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


