## One day from URC daily devotions

## Ruth 2: 1-13

Now Naomi had a kinsman on her husband's side, a prominent rich man, of the family of Elimelech, whose name was Boaz. And Ruth the Moabite said to Naomi, 'Let me go to the field and glean among the ears of grain, behind someone in whose sight I may find favour.' She said to her, 'Go, my daughter.' So she went. She came and gleaned in the field behind the reapers. As it happened, she came to the part of the field belonging to Boaz, who was of the family of Elimelech. Just then Boaz came from Bethlehem. He said to the reapers, 'The Lord be with you.' They answered, 'The Lord bless you.' Then Boaz said to his servant who was in charge of the reapers, 'To whom does this young woman belong?' The servant who was in charge of the reapers answered, 'She is the Moabite who came back with Naomi from the country of Moab. She said, "Please let me glean and gather among the sheaves behind the reapers." So she came, and she has been on her feet from early this morning until now, without resting even for a moment.' Then Boaz said to Ruth, 'Now listen, my daughter, do not go to glean in another field or leave this one, but keep close to my young women. Keep your eyes on the field that is being reaped, and follow behind them. I have ordered the young men not to bother you. If you get thirsty, go to the vessels and drink from what the young men have drawn.' Then she fell prostrate, with her face to the ground, and said to him, 'Why have I found favour in your sight, that you should take notice of me, when I am a foreigner?' But Boaz answered her, 'All that you have done for your mother-in-law since the death of your husband has been fully told me, and how you left your father and mother and your native land and came to a people that you did not know before. May the Lord reward you for your deeds, and may you have a full reward from the Lord, the God of Israel, under whose wings you have come for refuge!' Then she said, 'May I continue to find favour in your sight, my lord, for you have comforted me
and spoken kindly to your servant, even though I am not one of your servants.'

## Reflection

Have you ever had your DNA tested to find out where your ancestors hailed from? Those who have tried this are sometimes amazed to find that their roots lie in faraway countries. Since time immemorial, people have trekked across territorial borders, established themselves and built up whole new family trees.
These days, borders are harder to cross than they were in history and anyone attempting to establish a home in our country will face a barrage of obstacles and legalities that often seem designed to deter. Those fleeing, for example, war or famine may be described as refugees in sneering tones or even "illegals" and there is no guarantee that they will be tolerated, let alone welcomed.
Ruth the Moabite, transplanted in a foreign country to care for her mother-in-law, finds an unexpected welcome when she goes shyly into the fields to gather up gleanings from the harvest, the stalks of grain deliberately left behind for the needy. Boaz first greets his pickers kindly before spotting Ruth and inquiring about her. And when he learns who she is, he ensures that she is safe with the other women in the field and that she can refresh herself whenever she needs to. Moabites were not generally treated so warmly!
The ancient story of Ruth may be just that - a story - but one with a purpose. The theory is that it was written around the fourth century $B C$ with the deliberate intent of softening attitudes towards foreigners and people brought up as non-Jews, and also to tackle fears about mixed marriages.
There is an important reminder here for us. God's love does not discriminate. Man or woman, rich or poor, regardless of skin colour or country of origin, we are all loved. As Christians, we are asked to share that love.

## Introduction to Theme

In Luke 14: 25-33, we see Jesus travelling with a large crowd; Jesus tells them that following him involves difficult choices. He speaks of conflict, renouncing family ties and economic security, and of 'carrying their cross'. He gives two brief illustrations (parables) that caution against making a hasty decision. It's easy to allow our faith to be an added extra to our busy lives. This week's reading challenges us to explore whether we are willing to accept the consequences of a faith that comes first, following Jesus, becomimg a disciple. What truly influences us? Is God's way evident in our lives?

## Old Testament Reading from Psalm 1

Blessed is the one whose delight is in the law of the Lord. That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither. Whatever they do prospers. For the Lord watches over the way of the righteous.
The psalmist states that those who delight in and meditate on the law, which is the teaching, of the Lord are like trees planted by streams of water. The teaching of the Lord is not a burden, but a blessing because it is a gift from God for our life and its true growth and strength. Happiness lies in following the ways of God. Those who do so are likened to healthy trees, planted by life-giving streams and who bear good fruit. As we seek to delight in the Lord, we find it changes our lives. Our lives prosper, that is to say, they go well and flourish, and are useful, and therefore blessed. Amen

## Bible Reading: Luke 14: 25-33 The cost of being a disciple

${ }^{25}$ Large crowds were travelling with Jesus, and turning to them he said: ${ }^{26}$ 'If anyone comes to me and does not his hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters - yes, even their own life such a person cannot be my disciple. ${ }^{27}$ And whoever does not carry their cross and follow me cannot be my disciple.
${ }^{28}$ 'Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won't you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it? ${ }^{29}$ For if you lay the foundation and are not able to finish it, everyone who sees it will ridicule you, ${ }^{\mathbf{3 0}}$ saying, "This person began to build and wasn't able to finish."
${ }^{31}$ 'Or suppose a king is about to go to war against another king. Won't he first sit down and consider whether he is able with ten thousand men to oppose the one coming against him with twenty thousand? ${ }^{32}$ If he is not able, he will send a delegation while the other is still a long way off and will ask for terms of peace. ${ }^{33}$ In the same way, those of you who do not give up everything you have cannot be my disciples.

## Reflection: Loving God more

Jesus is once again on the road, after having a meal at a Pharisee's house as we heard last week from Rachel, speaking on humility. He is drawing large crowds (v.25), but this time with the emphasis on the cost of following Jesus. Three times Jesus repeats 'cannot be my disciple' as if his aim is to put off the casual enquirer. Out of the 9 verses here, only 4 of the verses ( $25-27$ and 33 ) cover Jesus' main emphasis. The other 5 verses ( $28-30$ and $31-32$ ) cover 2 explanatory parables about building a tower and forming an army.

Picking up on Jesus's previous table talk to the host about dinner guests (see v.12f) in last weeks reflection, where he said, 'when you give a lunch, don't just invite family - invite the poor and lowly', Jesus tells his would-be followers that being a disciple means family loyalties take second place. 'Hate' (v.26) in this context is not about how we should feel towards them but who we take our lead from. Hate here means to love less than, rather than positively loathe. In that culture where family ties were stronger and parental authority lasted longer than it does in today's western world, Jesus scandalously claimed an allegiance to God that took precedence over family. So we begin to understand him as speaking not about the depth of love for our families, but about our priorities when a choice has to made between them and God.

We've encountered this before (ch12:51-53) in my reflection 3 weeks ago where Jesus said, 'Do you think I came to bring peace on earth? No, I tell you, but division. ${ }^{52}$ From now on there will be five in one family divided against each other, three against two and so on'; Jesus is fleshing out those remarks here, stressing that the division results from the choice to follow him. But there is more: it is not just family; it costs us our lives. We are to 'hate' our own life (v26; ch9.23-25) ie. to love our life less than we love God. We are to deny ourselves and take up our cross (v.27; ch9.23). Again, this picks up on Jesus' earlier dinner conversation last week where the guests were too interested in wealth and possessions, in status and position in society. Jesus said to them, when you are invited, take the lowest place, and when the host comes he will say to you, friend, move up to a higher place, and you will be honoured. He who humbles himself will be exalted. (vv.7-11). A disciple must leave these things behind, like humbling themselves at the table, and set out behind a master who is going to Jerusalem to shoulder a cross.

Jesus then tells two parables (vv.28-33) that urge his hearers to weigh the cost before deciding to follow. He did not want people to come after him who hadn't first thought it through carefully. The first concerns the builder of a tower. Has he the money and materials to complete what he's started? If not, he will be open to ridicule by his neighbours. He or she should sit down and cost out their enterprise in advance, before they commit.

In the second parable, a king is on the brink of war. Surely he will weigh up the consequences of going to battle against an enemy with twice the military muscle, before rushing headlong into battle. It could result in humiliating defeat? The punchline to both parables is verse 33: are we prepared to give up everything to follow Jesus? For some the meaning may be literal. For others it means putting what we have at Jesus' disposal, to give our ambitions, belongings hopes to him, to love them less than our love for God. For everyone it means no longer calling the shots. We are bidding farewell to our old life with its allegiances and joining Jesus on the road in new life (v.25).

When we watch a great sporting event such as the Olympics or the Tour de France, part of the spectacle is the fact that competitors have given up and sacrificed so much in order to be able to compete. Hours of training every day, special diets and a testing training regime that intrudes into their private life - all so they have a shot at gold and glory. Jesus invites us to give up everything - here symbolised by all our material possessions - so that we can follow him and know glory. Amen

## We come now to celebrate the Sacrament of Communion

We are brought together as we remember. Let these symbols of bread and wine help to make Jesus real to us in his body and blood. A body that was broken for us and blood that was shed for us. In this sacrament, we are made one with him - delivered from the power of death into his Kingdom of life and love.

Almighty God, we remember that Jesus was born of Mary; he lived our common life on earth; he revealed your love as a Father; he showed us the way to live; he suffered and died for us; on the third
day you raised him from the dead; and he is present with us now through the Holy Spirit. In his presence, and in the company of all your people, we are grateful to celebrate the Lord's Supper. Amen

On the night before the crucifixion, when evening came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, 'I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover meal with you before I suffer. And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me.'
In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you, for the forgiveness of sins.' When they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives to Gethsemane.
